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## Notes From the D/C

## The District Commander's Thoughts

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Membership. Everyone's talking about it these days. At the National level, we're down to approximately 45,000 members from a high in the 60,000s fifteen years back. This year, membership in our organization is running 3-5% lower than last year depending on the month used for comparison (that's a loss approximately equal to the size of District 10 this year). Closer to home, as of the end of January, District 10 is trying to <u>Do Something</u> with nearly 12% fewer members. 12%! If averaged out across the district, this would be nearly 16 members per squadron. We know that members are the key to our fraternal (can't have events without them), civic (can't help the community without them) and educational (can't teach the public without them) aspects of our mission to promote safety in boating through education. The question is; how are you going to Do Something about it?

There is great debate at all levels of the organization about the reasons for our decline in membership. Rest assured, the National organization is looking at changes that create value to the extent people want to join. These are big changes, such as making our mission relevant in today's fast moving world, reevaluating the balance between tradition and progressiveness and making our educational offerings competitive to meet the needs of the modern recreational boating public. Changes in these areas are already brining us great new materials, better support and a higher level of efficiency. And, through the use of new, somewhat counter-intuitive approaches, it is expected we will become more effective at growing our organization. As a result, we've all been challenged to achieve the simple objective of growing our membership by 1% this year. Just 1%. In District 10, that's approximately 16 members, or what would have been an average of 1-2 members per squadron. But remember, we're down over 160 members, so that 1% growth goal is now effectively a 13% growth goal, or an objective to find an average of 16 new members per squadron!

How are we going to do this? As "cuisine for consideration," I offering the following...

We often look at membership growth goals as a means to finance the organization or to increase our ability to do the important work we do (promote safety in boating...see above). Unarguably, this is part of why we want to grow our organization. But what if we look at our growth goal as something different, perhaps something that has a deeper, more human reason for being worth pursuit? How then might that change our approach, and our success?

I personally have found friendships with members

Cdr Dave Biddick, SN, who earned the Golden Eagle award this year for his efforts advancing Cooperative Charting in the district, found <u>rewarding employment</u> because of his involvement as a member. I can tell you of at least four members who found <u>love</u>, were married and became two couples. 209 members in 2005 gained <u>knowledge</u>.

Knowledge, humility, social conscience, personal rewards, friendships and love. Quite the benefits to offer perspective new members of a boating organization (guaranteed only with involvement, of course)! Quite the benefits of <u>your</u> membership! Oh, and there is that education and safety in boating thing too...

Consider this; recruiting new members increases your opportunity to grow to these kinds of experiences. How are you going to be <u>Creating Possibilities</u> of your own in the 2006-2007 Watch Year to offer these kinds of experiences to somebody you know?

## **D10** Executive Officer

This has been an exciting and active time for your Executive Department. We have had activity in most of our departments during the first ten months of this watch year.

### Co-op Charting -

fforts

<u>Honors</u> - At the Annual Meeting, Door County received an award for #1 Squadron in the Nation, Dave Biddick received recognition as the #1 Individual in the nation, and Dave won the Golden Eagle Award for the most effective District Chairperson in the nation. It was quite a sweep for Door County and District 10.

<u>Goal</u> – District and all Squadrons make the Honor Roll, The District has made the Honor roll and 8 of 11 squadrons have also. We are hoping the rest will finish strong by 1 April.

<u>Program Changes</u> – The USPS Cooperative Charting web site will be unavailable starting 4/3/2006 until 4/17/2006 for scheduled maintenance. On 4/17/2006 the new USPS Geodetic Data site where you can enter geodetic reports will be made available on the USPS web site. The new version of the USPS Cooperative Charting web site will also available on 4/17/2005.

The standards for reporting geodetic marks have changed: Recoveries for landmark stations, including destroyed reports should no longer be submitted; Not found reports must be accompanied by supporting text that describes what has changed about the original description that might cause the station to be lost. Please do not report a station NOT FOUND if the last recovery is a NOT FOUND. This goes for POOR/DISTURBED too.

New Traveling Trophy – We have awarded our first D10 Pelican Award at the Fall Conference. The D10 Pelican Award is given to the Squadron with the most active and productive Co-op Charting Program. It is a handsome oak and acrylic combination with a real geodetic mark imbedded in the base and the Pelican symbol on the raised acrylic. Given Door County's #1 National Status, it obviously ended up there in its inaugural presentation.

<u>Goal</u> - Roll out District Co-op Charting Traveling Trophy Contest - Complete

### **Public Relations / Marketing**

Safe Boating Week Initiative - There is to be a new initiative for Boating Education during Safe Boating week next spring. National is requesting that squadrons try to teach a boating class or seminar during Safe Boating Week. A substantial amount of publicity is planned, and new AV materials and Public Service Announcements are available. The squadron PRO's will need to coordinate an advertising campaign with the Educational Department in order to draw students to this important new initiative. There are some fresh Audio Visual Materials available from District featuring Popeye and Olive Oyl to promote Safe Boating classes. Contact D/Lt Jeff Davis, AP to receive your materials.

Reimbursement - Ten of eleven Squadrons have requested reimbursement for Cooperative Advertising from national and should now have their checks. Total disbursements were \$1,478, with \$1279 being reimbursed by national. There was a minor unbudgeted variance in that Squadrons received 100% reimbursement for the first \$60 of materials, but district only received 50% of that back. This resulted in an additional above plan expenditure of \$199. The free material order program has been discontinued. In addition, a couple of hundred dollars that would have been available from national had there been additional claims went unused.

<u>Goal</u> – Co-op Advertising material distributed via disk (with manual backup) to incoming commanders prior to winter council. This was completed.

<u>Contests</u> - Jeff Davis reminds the squadrons to begin saving materials for entries to the three public relations contests, (Chapman Scrapbook, Upton Video, & Mahnken PowerPoint). They will be due next year on 1 March.

<u>Goal</u> – Increase the number entries in PR contests – pending at time of publication.

### Legislative Liaison

<u>Minnesota</u> - Minnesota passed legislation requiring life jackets for children less than 10 years of age. It should be noted that this is different than the Federal requirement of 12 years old and under. Mandatory Education was introduced in the Legislature but did not pass.



Wisconsin - The Wisconsin bill that requires PFD use by children 12 and under, is still stuck in the Assembly rules committee. The Senate version of the bill passed the Senate but the senior leadership of the Assembly is preventing the Assembly Bill 260 from being advanced from the Rules Committee to the Assembly floor where a vote can take place. It is hoped that Wisconsin residents, if they support this legislation, would contact their Assembly Representative and the Assembly leaders that are not permitting this bill to

advance and have a floor vote.

The second bill (AB248) that requires completion of a boating safety course for anyone born after 1 January 1989 in order to operate a motorboat was passed by the Assembly voting 91 to 3 on December 6th. The senate should schedule a vote shortly. It is expected to pass and be signed into law this spring. Any encouragement that you could give your senator to pass this bill would be appreciated.

### Safety

All eleven squadrons have submitted Safety Reports to the District Safety Officer and these have been forwarded to national.

<u>Goal</u> – All squadrons participate in a safety effort and submit paperwork by 1 October. All Squadrons participated in an event and submitted paperwork, final submission to National 7 November.

<u>Goal</u> – Recreational Boating Safety Honor Roll – we believe we have achieved this goal but have not been able to confirm our status.

### Radio-Technical

The American Radio Relay League and USPS formally ratified a memorandum of understanding (MOU) on June 4, 2005 The MOU spells out areas where the two organizations can work together in educational activities of overlapping or mutual interest to their respective memberships.

### Vessel Safety Checks

New Procedure - A new online procedure has been introduced at the Annual Meeting for sending Vessel Examinations to headquarters. From now on, local VSC chairs will enter summary data for each exam online, and hold the forms locally for backup. We will no longer be required to mail or fax forms into headquarters.

For 2005, District 10 completed 856 examinations in the district or 80% of the previous years total of 1071. Those districts in our region are at 90% of last year's totals. We have lost 11 inspectors as inspectors in the initial class of inspectors have dropped away from the program and are not being replaced quickly enough. That is why there is an emphasis on new inspectors in the Squadron VSC Program Excellence (Traveling Trophy).

<u>Goal</u> – Roll out our district VSC Traveling trophy contest – complete.

Goal – Improve District standing in comparative statistics. - NO

### **Recreational Boating Safely Visitation Program**

This committee was organized after the spring conference. It is the result of an agreement with the USCG Auxiliary to expand the traditional Dealer Visitation Program. It envisions a program of visits, literature drops, and the building of relationships with an expanded network. These will be places such as sport shops, barbershops, doctor's offices, anyplace where boaters or potential boaters may traffic. P/D/C Art Mollica, presented a workshop at the fall conference introducing the program, and has opened up a session being held in St. Paul 25 March from 0900-1200 to other squadrons. ### **Squadron Development**

A development effort has been underway in Dubuque, Iowa. D/Lt Jim Paul-Washa and D/1<sup>st</sup>/Lt Dick Baker are planning to have a booth at the Dubuque Boat Show 24-27 February and expect to follow up with a Boat Smart Class yet this spring.

<u>Goal</u> – Build a core group of locally interested people in Dubuque, Iowa to charter a Provisional Squadron. – Pending

#### Budget

As of 25 January, the department had spent \$2,768 or its \$3,200 budget, or 86.5%.

Just take and pass the Instructor Development Course. Because of this new requirement, I encourage all squadrons to offer the ID course every year. It is also easy to stay recertified. Just offer the two-hour instructor recertification seminar in your squadron or take it at the fall district conference. These two-hour seminars extend certification for four years. Congratulations to those members from D 10 that attended the seminar in Orlando. Those attending besides me were Maury Rice, Jenny Rice, Don Schult, Bernie Dohr, Al Harmon, Kris Harmon, Mike Wiedel, Jeff Hamilton, Don Hansen and Greg Holmen. Their certification is now good through 1/05/2010.

## **D10 Treasurer Report**

As I write this article, I found that I was just getting the hang of the treasurer's job and here the watch year is almost over! Seriously, it has been a great year for the Treasurer's department. All goals have been met this year; we have transitioned to a computer system using generally accepted accounting principles, which has streamlined the reporting, budgeting and resulted in tighter financial control. The District Bridge and Council received monthly budget reports so that they knew exactly where District 10 was financially, every step of the way.

During the year, I was able to provide the Squadron Treasurer's with assistance on any problems that cropped up, provided power point training seminars on new dues handling procedures and produced a nifty brochure for a desk reference on dues handling for the squadrons. I was able to address some of our "Five Somethings" initiatives that District Commander Hamilton implemented this watch year. I attended all national meetings and all district conferences as well as attending meetings and a rendezvous hosted by squadrons outside my home squadron. Finally the service and communication to all levels of the district was considerably improved.

Another accomplishment this watch year, was a thorough review of the Enrichment Fund and Reserve Fund and separating them into two different accounts, so that interest earnings on both accounts could be tracked and reported separately. Last but certainly not least, the big news is for the first time in a few years, we realized the full budgeted revenue planned by the budget we proposed, and have a balanced budget. I can't take credit for this, for it is you, our valued members, who have shown the faith to steer our course out of the shoals and into deeper water. Credit also goes to the officers of your current bridge who have done a great job of overseeing their departmental budgets, and "tightened the belt" on expenses. Credit should also be given to P/ D/C Don Schult, AP and D/C Jeff Hamilton, AP for their leadership and assistance with these issues.

We are well on our way to restoring the lost equity we have suffered in the past years. I can tell you that the

job of Treasurer is far easier to perform when there is money in the bank to cover the expenses of running the District! I appreciate the opportunity to have served as your Treasurer this past watch year, and hope to continue the good work

we've accomplished, into this next watch year.



## Plans from 'The New Guys'

We positioned involvement on the bottom. Some time ago, a USPS study revealed, if a member was not involved early, the Squadron would not retain that member for than 2 years. Bottom line, **involvement drives retention**.

Retention assists membership growth and growth must be the goal of every squadron. Without growth, the jobs of the squadron will continuously go to the same people. When that happens, burnout occurs. What follows is a Squadron that can't seem to get people to step up, and as P/D/C Jeff would say, DO SOMETHING!

With this foundational understanding, each Squadron should focus on Involvement to drive retention and a focus on retention to leverage membership growth. Maybe you know it under the name Marine Dealer Visitation Program or have seen those USCG blue stickers on the door of your favorite marine dealer.

Recreational Boating Safety Visitation Program (RBSVP) is the new coalition effort between the USCG, USCG(Aux) and Power Squadron to expand the distribute safe boating information to the general public.

Whereas the old program worked exclusively with marine dealers and marinas, the revamped program is directed towards "any place boaters visit or wait." Think about these possibilities: church activities center; gas stations; barber shop; beauty salon; liquor store; hospital emergency room; grocery stores; etc.

Organized as part of the Vessel Safety Committee, the RBSVP program will involve all adult squadron members.

Because you are the contact person for any business/organization you sign-on to the program, you must pass an open-book examination to determine your knowledge of the program, USPS and vessel safety. On the national VSC committee web-page is a link to the RBSVP "Best Practices" guide, which contains all the information needed for earning your certification as a Program Visitor.
