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Did you know that our USPS now has 11 seminars available with 7 more coming by the end of next year? This powerful line-up represents a

tremendous opportunity for updating the skills and knowledge of our members and for attracting new membership. I encourage each member to log onto the national website and see what's available. Then get involved. Ask your SEO when you can take the seminars that interest you. And help promote these seminars to the general public and to your boating friends who are not yet members of our great organization. Finally, your SEO may need some instructor help, so if you can help, please volunteer. (And if he needs another certified instructor, please take Instructor Development.) We clearly have the best material in the marine industry. Now we just need to fill the classrooms and provide enthusiastic instructors. It's all about teamwork, boating safety and having fun.

Did you know that our USPS now has insurance coverage for on-the-water activities sanctioned by the local squadrons? This means that the skills discussed in classes such as Seamanship and Sail can now be taught on-the-water. This presents a revolutionary opportunity to attract new membership. At the Detroit Governing Board last week, two squadrons reported the great success they had experienced with on-the-water training and member recruitment. They did point out that the logistical planning required for on-the-water training significantly exceeded that for classroom instruction. But the results speak for themselves: the extra effort is worth it! I encourage each member to talk to your SEO and get involved in how your squadron can introduce on-the-water training. As with the seminars, help promote these offerings to the general public and to your friends. Tell them the Power Squadron is the place to go for action. Get them to join. And, if you can help in some way to plan and present these classes, please let your SEO know. It's all about teamwork, boating safety and having fun. continued on page 5

Did you know that our USPS is working with USCG encouragement to provide an educational framework for certifying boat operator competency? This program, still in its infancy, is intended to support the type of certification already in place in Europe and now encouraged by a UN resolution. It envisions 4 levels of certification: Inland (for small lakes and rivers), Coastal (applies to Great Lakes cruising along the shore and to the Mississippi river system), Advanced Coastal (applies to Great Lakes crossings) and Off-Shore (for ocean crossings). In order to be certified at each level, individuals need to have taken ce rtain USPS classes or seminars and to have demonstrated certain on-the-water skills. You can think of the USPS membership as a beta test organization prior to a roll-out to the general public. This public roll-out is probably several years and multiple program iterations away, but we have now a great opportunity to influence the boating safety future and to further position ourselves as the organization to join for the absolute best in training programs.

In the meantime, before we can roll-out this program to our general membership, we need to get a number of Advance Certifiers qualified in the powerboat handling skills required for Inland Navigator certification. We will be doing this at our fall conference in Door County under the guidance of Art Mollica who has been qualified in the requisite skills by US Sailing. In addition to Art, 7 other members, geographically dispersed throughout our district, will be participating in the skills demonstration. I encourage every conference attendee to watch this exercise on Saturday afternoon, October 25th, because we plan to offer this same skill qualification opportunity to all interested members starting next spring. These qualification events will be conducted locally by the October 25th graduates. I also encourage every member to investigate this program and to set their own personal goal for establishing a positive example for the general public. We plan to make this program a major focus of the 2009 and 2010 rendezvous. I would love to have all our active boaters certified as Inland Navigators in 2009 and Coastal Navigators in 2010. Check out what you would need to do and get involved. As I said before, it's all about teamwork, boating safety and having fun.

As I write this the end of September is approaching and another boating season is about over. I'm not a big fan of the upcoming season with all that hard water but it will pass and I'll appreciate the thaw that much more.

I just wanted to pass along a brief update of the districts financials. After 5 months into this watch year we have reached 97% of our budgeted dues income. Since by this time of the year most dues income has been received we should just meet or be slightly under the budget income goals for this watch year. Expenses at this point are tracking with the budgeted amounts and no issues are anticipated.

The bridge has opted to continue in a conservative vein with regards to the next watch years proposed budget. Starting with an assumed 3% decline in income from dues and decreasing our expenses particularly in regards to the mailing of this communicator through a bulk mail permit we should be able to achieve the same financial results for this time next watch year.

The restoration of our Reserves Fund will reach the \$13,000 targeted balance by the end of this watch year due to the expert guidance of our past treasurer and bridge members. This means we no longer need to budget monies to restore this fund. These monies can then be used to cover inflationary cost in other parts of the budget without having to consider dues increases at this time. In summary the District finances are in good shape for now.

P/D/C TRYGVE E. THORESEN, AP TRIBUTE

A long-time member of the Madison Sail & Power Squadron passed away on Monday, May 19, 2008, in Madison at the age of 77.

Trygve grew up in Mount Horeb after his family moved from Chicago when he was very young. Trygve was active with Boy Scouts while growing up, becoming the first Eagle Scout in Mount Horeb. He graduated from Mount Horeb High School in 1948, and was drafted into the U.S. Army in 1951. He graduated from Artillery Officers Candidate School in Fort Sill, Oklahoma and served with the First Cavalry Division in Japan. Trygve separated from the service as a first lieutenant in 1954. Trygve was united in marriage shortly after to Marion A. (Marty) Thoresen. Marion and Trygve would have celebrated their 54th Anniversary this year.

Trygve attended the University of Wisconsin-Madison, where he received his BBA degree. He was career executive with the State of WI, retiring from the DNR in 1992 after more than 33 years of service.

Trygve joined USPS after the family gave up camping in the 70's. He served the Madison Power Squadron in various offices up to and including Squadron Commander in 1982. Trygve went on to serve the District, becoming District Commander in 1989. He remained active, holding various District and Squadron positions until his death.

Trygve is survived by his wife, Marion and three children; Erik T. (Marilee) of McFarland, Christopher J. of Wyoming, Ohio, and Michael G. (Kimberly) of Bloomfield Hills, Mich.; his grandchildren, Paul T. and Graham M. of McFarland, Tess A., Logan C. and Haley E. of Wyoming, Ohio, and Alexander M., Sally A. and Annie M. of Bloomfield Hills, Mich.; and a brother, Erling T. Thoresen of Coconut Grove, Fla.¹

Trygve dropped off a treasure trove of periodicals and scrap books about two years ago that he compiled during his tenure. As Squadron Historian, Trygve was honoring me with the opportunity to preserve some of his memories for the benefit of all. Trygve was having health problems at the time, and it was clear that he was planning ahead.

I recently re-discovered four issues of Harbor Lights among the collection from his year as Commander. I'd like to share with you some of Trygve's observations

during that time.

Commander's Corner May 21, 1982

"It is always difficult to know what to say in one's first set of comments. First and foremost, I want to thank the Squadron for having faith in me by electing me Commander. I will do all that I am capable of to enable the Squadron to have a year filled with success". During 1982
