

#### COMMENTS from the COMMANDER

Here are some other thoughts and take-aways from the meetings I attended:

- The national marketing program we've always asked for is here, and your Bridge will be
  introducing it at the Fall conference in Oshkosh November 11-13. Not everyone will think
  it's perfect, but it is something that has the potential to make a difference.
- Think about posting your public education classes on Craig's List.
- Nationally, we have lower renewals on free memberships than on paid memberships. The 18 months for the price of 12 seems to make more difference. (These members have "skin in the game" and more time to get involved, take additional classes, etc.)
- We should always look at the Coast Guard Auxiliary as collaborators, never as competitors.
- USPS member benefits are awesome, clearly a secret that shouldn't be kept. (25% off on car rentals from Avis? Who knew?)

My BIGGEST take-away from the Fall Governing Board meeting? — The Coast Guard Commander who applauded every member of the United States Power Squadrons, complimenting our **belief**, our **dedication**, our **education**, our **passion** and our **involvement** in promoting boating education and safety. This is who we are! I know I forget about this when I look at my unfinished To-Do list and regret that I didn't even get to my Should-Do and Could-Do lists. Perhaps we all need to stop next time we pass a mirror and stretch the confines of humility to give ourselves a big smile and a pat on the back. What we do matters!

#### **A Challenge**

In 2015, District 10 was one of only five USPS Districts that grew its membership. At this writing, we have 12 fewer members than at the end of last year. It is my hope that we can finish 2016 with at least one more member than we finished 2015. All we need to do is keep the members we have and add an average of slightly more than 1 per squadron.

My challenge to each Squadron is to increase your membership by 2 people between now and the end of 2016. Two people! Speaking of service opportunities, it is the time of year when our District and Squadron nominations committees will be actively seeking members who will accept leadership positions for the 2017 Watch Year. To quote P/D/C Dale Perry:

We aim to discover an effective leadership team this year, a team whose members will [work together to guide our District and Squadrons] through face-to-face and technology-assisted cooperation."

# **District Educational Department**

Once again, the boating season is coming to a close. I hope all of you had a great summer filled with fun, family, and calm waters. Your district bridge has been hard at work in continuing the efforts of education, boating safety, and the work of USPS. We are making every effort so that the Fall Conference weekend in Oshkosh will be memorable as well as educational. Enjoy "Oshkosh on the Water".

As your District Educational Officer, I attended the 2016 USPS Governing Board meeting in Pittsburgh. As usual there are a lot of things happening and I invite you to read through my report and consider getting involved. Bring your thoughts and ideas to our 2016 Fall Conference. My approach while attending national meetings is to bring back things which I believe can be of value to D-10 squadrons. Please take some time to consider them and feel free to make them part of our ongoing discussions.

#### **Drive Membership with the Public ABC3 Course**

USPS membership success is based on the experiences a student has in our public presentation of ABC3. Our online ABC3 is not going to generate the membership and revenue growth compared to the growth we experience from the class room. We need to increase our classroom ABC3 offerings. Stress the fun parts of membership. The classroom environment is unique as it promotes interaction. It is our job as teachers to make the course enjoyable. Nationally, 120 squadrons did not teach ABC3 last year (roughly 1/3 of our USPS squadrons). Each District 10 squadron needs to conduct at least one ABC3 classroom course every watch year. This is a minimum requirement to remain a viable squadron. Please consider scheduling a fall course now and another early in 2017.

# <u>Chapman Nomination from Every District Each</u> <u>Year</u>

Our National Educational Officer wants every district to submit a nomination annually for the Chapman award. This is the ultimate way to award the great teachers among us. District 10 does not have a submission this watch year. Now is the time to start with submission for your nominee for next year. The submission takes a team effort. There are many requirements in preparing the nomination. Your DEO or ADEO can assist your squadron in the process.

# Teaching Aids Presentation

There has been a decrease in submissions for the teaching aids competition. If my memory is correct, there were only 5 submissions at Orlando last February. There has been a lack of interest in holding a teaching aids competition in District 10. Please your consider bringing squadron's teaching aid to our Fall Conference. The financials of the district are thorough and strong. We did a very good job last fiscal year of staying within our budget and I anticipate we will meet our budget goals again for this fiscal watch year.

We have half of the fiscal year to go, along with the fall conference coming soon. We have realized approximately 63% of the budgeted revenue for the fiscal year to date. Basically, this is the only revenue coming into the district budget.

The District 10 Bridge works hard to follow the budget and be fiscally responsible to keep our fiscal position solid and our budgets balanced. The District 10 Bridge is currently working on the next fiscal year's budget. This will be presented at the Fall Conference in November.

We are not planning on an increase in District Dues from the current \$19/year for Primary Active Members and \$26/year for Family Membership.

Overview of the Annual Budget Approval Process:

- 1. The Bridge and the Budget and Finance Committee work together with the Treasurer to propose a Budget for the coming year.
- 2. The Bridge and the Budget and Finance Committee review the proposed budget and make a recommendation to approve or revise based on available funds.
- 3. The Bridge reviews the Committee's recommendations and makes changes if required.
- 4. The council reviews/discusses and approves or disapproves the proposed Budget prior to the Fall Conference.
- 5. The Conference delegation reviews/discusses and approves or disapproves the proposed Budget at the Fall Conference.

# District 10's Electric Shock Drowning Awareness Initiative

In District 10, many of us became aware of electric shock drowning because of a seminar during the 2013 Spring Conference. P/R/C Alan Wentworth, SN invited speaker Kevin Ritz to give a presentation on the topic. Kevin's son Lucas died while swimming in a marina back in the late 1990's.


Kevin Ritz is a marine corrosion and galvanic expert, a technical person as well as an avid boater who wouldn't believe the coroner who pronounced that Lucas died from drowning when Lucas's lungs, in fact, were not filled with water. Mr. Ritz persevered until he proved the real cause of Lucas's death, now known as electric shock drowning.

District 10 has taken on a public service project in the spirit of the mission of the United States Power Squadrons® to instruct the boating community about the Electric Shock Drowning phenomenon. We're calling this District 10's Electric Shock Drowning Awareness Initiative.

Earlier this year, at the Spring Conference, we approved the purchase of 11 ESD Awareness signs, one sign to be sent to each of the 11 squadrons in D/10. The members of each squadron are asked to contact marina operators in their boating area and encourage them to procure these signs and post them in

their marinas. We also purchased tri-fold brochures as an Electric Shock Drowning instructional aid and are making them available to squadrons so they can be placed anywhere the boating community congregates.

What is our progress in this endeavor? Preliminary and incomplete reports indicate that, at the time of this writing, 38 marinas have been contacted and 123 signs have been ordered.

ESD tri-fold brochures have been placed in 26 locations.

Contact your Squadron Commander and/or your Squadron Executive Officer if you are interested in helping USPS® and D/10 getting these instructional materials out to where the boating community can learn about the deadly dangers of Electric Shock Drowning and what to do to prevent it.

A potential cause for drowning is the presence of stray electrical power from a boat leaking into the water. This is known as electric shock drowning. Metal surfaces of a boat leaking power into the water can create zones of high-energy potential. Stray current entering salt water is less of a problem than the same situation in fresh water. Salt water is a good conductor and it carries current away to ground quickly. Fresh water is a poor conductor and when alternating current forms an electrical potential near a boat, the current can paralyze a swimmer. Stray electric current has caused many drownings, but post-mortem examinations will not link this problem to the death. The problem can be reduced by prohibiting swimming near boats connected to shore power and ensuring marinas comply with National Fire Protection Association Standard 303 for marinas.
