Cooperative Charting Program: Geodetic Marker Recovery Program By Chairperson Lt/C Sandra Broekema

Looking for a fun family activity for your winter snowbird travels? Cooperative Charting can be done outdoors anywhere in the U.S. with a little pre-planning and it can be fun for everyone from 7 to 70!

You can scout your locations BEFORE YOU GO at <u>www.ngs.noaa.gov</u> by entering the city and state or zip code of where you'll be visiting. I find it helps to print out the full data sheet and at least one photograph showing the surrounding landmarks (if available). Choose several potential marks in the area, in case one or more cannot be found or were damaged or destroyed by recent construction activity.

You can also scout locations IN REAL TIME by downloading the full application "BENCHMARK HUNTER" on the AppStore for iPhones (\$9.99) or "BENCHMAP" on Google Play for Android (FREE).

Here's an image of a geodetic marker that we found while vacationing in Grand Teton National Park. We stumbled across it at the summit of Cadillac Mountain and took the requisite photographs using "SOLOCATOR" application (\$0.99 + \$4.99 industry pack add in) on my iPhone. It was a great opportunity to explain our volunteer civic role in the Power Squadron to the Park Ranger on duty. We submitted the report once we got back and National emailed back that this was the highest elevation (at 7,727 feet above sea level) that had been recovered by USPS volunteers all year!

The United States Power Squadron volunteers provide a civic service to the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA) by physically locating and documenting the current condition of Geodetic Survey Markers (also known as benchmarks). These markers are typically 3 inch diameter metal disks securely mounted on the earth's surface, often found near highways, bridges and railroads. Sometimes the markers are protected by PVC pipes and caps a few inches below grade. Sometimes they are accompanied by a nearby witness post to alert interested parties to their general location. These stable references are used to precisely locate property boundaries and other public infrastructure.

This volunteer activity is coordinated through the national, district and squadron level Cooperative Charting Committees, and we rely on individual volunteers to find the markers and take notes and special photographs documenting the GPS coordinates and condition of markers every few years. The state highway departments also perform this work as part of their responsibilities as time permits.

The NOAA maintains a database of these markers with searchable maps and detailed descriptions including local landmarks and directions for locating the markers. Many markers (but not all) also have links to historical photographs of the marks including from a distance of 25 to 50 feet showing critical semi-permanent landmarks (i.e. utility poles, fire hydrants and buildings). Over many years, some of these landmarks are moved, removed or paved over – so it is important to keep a record of any changes.

Since D10 members live and boat in cold winter climates, Cooperative Charting is most easily accomplished in the spring and fall. However, this is a fun family activity even in the winter if you vacation or visit warmer climates – since you can look for markers anywhere in the U.S.!

In addition to locating and documenting the condition of geodetic survey markers, the USPS volunteers also work with "CruisersNet" to keep Marina Surveys up to date.

<u>www.cruisersnet.net</u> is a great resource for cruisers – especially those on "transient" adventures on The Great Circle tour or navigating the coastal areas and rivers in the US. This website provides regional weather alerts, tides and currents along with a directory of Marinas, complete with facilities (transient slips, fuel, pump out stations) and contact information.

You may want to gather data on Marinas for the lakes and rivers in your squadron area, as a resource to your membership. A 3 page Marina Survey form is available on USPS.org or by contacting me at the information below. A Survey can be completed in about 15 minutes with an onsite interview with the owner – including snapping a few helpful photographs. Each submitted and approved new Marina Survey qualifies for up to 35 points (25 points for updates on existing Marinas) on the Cooperative Charting Honor Roll.

The Purpose of Sea Scouts

For over 100 years Sea Scouting has promoted better citizenship and improved members' boating skills through instruction and practice in water safety, boating skills, outdoor, social, service experiences, and knowledge of our maritime heritage.

The Sea Scout Program

Sea Scouts is a co-ed program for youth 14 to 20 years old. Sea Scout units–called ships- are established across the country on oceans, bays, rivers, and lakes. They provide limitless opportunities and exciting challenges that you won't find anywhere else. Sea Scouts is a place to grow and learn, find adventure, and build long lasting friendships.

Seamanship

The best part of Sea Scouts is cruising and mastering the skills you learn with your shipmates. On board a vessel you share hands-on experiences as helmsman and navigator, lookout and cook, sail handler and engineer. You and your shipmates will plan and conduct your annual cruise – summer camp underway. Imagine sailing the Caribbean, cruising to Alaska, fishing, swimming, diving, snorkeling or anything else your ship wants to do!

Scouting

Sea Scouts is youth led and adult mentored. You and your shipmates lead your Sea Scout program. Elected youth leaders plan and conduct the program and adult leaders guide and support your efforts as you learn important leadership and life skills. As you gain experience you will have the opportunity to contribute as a leader in your ship. Sea Scouts are recognized and rewarded for the things they learn and do. You can earn valuable certifications in SCUBA, boating safety, lifesaving, and CPR, as well as advance in rank from Apprentice to Quartermaster. Each certification and level of advancement marks your growth as a sailor and a leader.

Service

Sea Scouts take service very seriously. Sea Scouts perform various kinds of service from service to their ship, to community service. They participate in services such as river or beach clean-up efforts, food drives, and youth programs. Sea Scouts also participate in flag ceremonies and serve as honor guards at various community events.

Social

Sea Scouts provides opportunities to share experiences with other young people who share your interests. As your ship participates in fun and exciting activities like sailing regattas, rowing races, and rendezvous, you'll learn and grow with your shipmates. You'll even have the opportunity to meet Sea Scouts from other parts of your community, the nation, and even the world!

Training

Sea Scouts receive training in seamanship and leadership. From ship meetings, long cruises, a USCG sponsored Safety at Sea, to SEAL (Sea Scout Experience Advanced Leadership) training, you will be learning every step of the way whether you realize it or not.

Limitless Opportunities

You and your shipmates lead your Sea Scout program, so you make it what you want. In Sea Scouts you may cruise the San Juan Islands or SCUBA dive in the Florida Keys. You may be competing in the Koch International Sea Scout Cup alongside Scouts from around the world, or cruise aboard "America's Tall Ship" the USCG Barque Eagle. In Sea Scouts, you build your own adventure!

Adventure on the Water

<u>What makes Sea Scouts so unique</u> is getting out on the water. Sea Scout ships use a variety of boats from small outboard motorboats to large sailing yachts and vessels. In your ship you will learn piloting and the rules of the road, navigation and how to read the weather. You will be fascinated by maritime history and traditions, learn knots and fancy rope work, master boat maintenance, engine service, and marine electronics skills. No matter what your ship does, you will discover thrills that you just can't get anywhere else.

USPS Squadrons sponsoring Sea Scout Ships

The Sea Scout program can help individual Squadrons by assisting boating safety activities and presenting community outreach programs that promote safe boating. For example, the Sea Scouts can help during organized Vessel Safety Checks, help promote life jacket awareness promotions and assist in National Safe Boating Week programs. The Sea Scouts can help increase membership by offering membership to the scouts and the leaders.


